Nearly every person would agree with this simple equation.

When choosing a school for our three boys, Kari and I wanted to find a school that not only

excelled at teaching this kind of education basic but also the "why" behind this truth. We wanted to be a part of a school community that has a holistic view of the truth and power of the Gospel. Knowing facts to just pass a test and get good grades falls far short of the purpose of education. The best education instills awe for our amazing Creator and Savior. Everything coheres in Christ and an educational environment that is lacking in the worship of the one, true God is never going to properly prepare our three sons for the calling the Lord has for them.

Over the past century, the Lord has used SCS to shape hearts and minds to worship Jesus through disciplines of Scholarship, Discipleship and Citizenship. I'd like to share a few thoughts on how these characteristics are alive in the daily life of our SCS community today.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN & STEERING COMMITTEE UPDATE



We have all heard the saying "a picture is worth a thousand words," and for the most part this rings true. The picture seen above

does hold up to that, however the story around this image speaks a much louder message.

The story goes like this: it was the Tuesday after January's big snowstorm and a woman who lives across the street from our elementary campus was attempting to back her car out of her driveway. The car became stuck in the snow. This neighbor was concerned about leaving her car in its current position yet was unsure how to get it moved. She went inside her home and called a friend to discuss. Unbeknownst to her, that friend happened to be a parent of students at SCS. This parent jumped into action and called the school. Amy Kaat picked up and without hesitation, went to Mr. VanDrunen's room, at which point he called a group of young students into service. The next part of this story was best detailed on the neighbor's own Facebook page when she wrote, "I heard a holler" and before she knew it the group of students had pushed her car out of the snow. Problem solved!

SCS's mission statement begins with, "In partnership with the Christian community." To me, this story shows

I'm proud to say that the story above was one of many examples I could choose from to highlight a positive impact our school has made within our community. We just



MEET THE VAN DER JAGT FAMILY – FEATURING NANCY DE JONG

How did your family originally get connected to SCS?

My parents, Don and Ann Van Der Jagt, were searching for alternative options to public education, and heard about SCS from their friends. Prior to this, my parents attended public schools and my mom taught at a public school, but after sending my siblings and me to SCS, we became a devoted Christian school family.

Who from your family has attended SCS or worked at SCS?

I ('89) and my sisters, Jill Rozendal ('91) and Stacy Kerwin ('93) graduated from SCS. My daughter, Anneke, my niece, Jamie, and nephew, AJ Kerwin currently attend SCS.

While my mom, Ann, did not have the opportunity to attend, she worked at SCS from 1980-2002. She taught 5th-6th grade math for two years, 6th grade language arts and grammar for one year, and Kindergarten for 19 years. My father, Don, and my sister Stacy served as board members, my husband Steve, served on the Steering Committee,

and I even mini-taught during college at SCS for two weeks.

What are some of your family's favorite memories?

My mom's favorite thing about teaching at SCS was that God was in all of the curriculum. She greatly enjoyed the community, connecting with the students and the parents. Our family always remembers our dad, Don, cheering a lot at games and at times, yelling at the refs. Our family continues to enjoy spending time together at our children's sporting events.

When I was younger, I specifically remember the excitement we had for the new letter person to come

out of Miss Streelman's closet, Miss Hull's reading of the *Trumpet of the Swan*, "The Music Machine" musical, the CSI basketball tournament, and Mr. Pool's demonstration of how atoms moved (as he flew and bounced around the science room).

Our teachers and coaches genuinely cared for us and did whatever

they could to help us grow in our education and more importantly in our faith. Why did you and your husband send your children to SCS?

We also have enjoyed the earlier connection between the middle school students of OCS and SCS through middle school fun nights and Junior Eagles teams, which helps our children transition from middle school at OCS to high school at SCS.

ALUMNUS SPOTLIGHT

Dr. Rachael Filwett (Jensema) '09 – Postdoctoral Research Scholar at University of Iowa

Tell us about your current field of

study, where you are, and what you are doing. I work at the University of Iowa as a Postdoctoral Research Scholar. I'm a Space Physicist which means I study various plasmas and particles, particularly how they interact with magnetic fields and planets in our solar system. I finished my PhD in May 2018 in a joint fellowship program with the University of Texas at San Antonio and the Southwest Research Institute. For my dissertation work, I studied the acceleration and transport of heavy ions near Earth in fast solar wind structures. Then, in June 2018, my husband Paul, and I, along with our two dogs, moved to the Iowa City area so I could take a position at the University of Iowa as a postdoc. I am part of a research group that studies Earth's radiation belts. I personally am studying solar energetic particles originating in solar flares and how they behave if they penetrate into the radiation belts. I've also spent some time developing and building instrumentation for miniaturized satellites called "CubeSats."

Why is what you are doing important? Space Physics deals with something called "Space Weather". Just like you get the forecast for your local weather, there are government agencies such as NASA and NOAA that provide space weather forecasts. These forecasts are used by a wide variety of organizations to protect their space assets. The increased radiation associated with solar and geomagnetic storms can be damaging to satellites, pose a health risk for astronauts, destroy transformers and power lines, and put the health of airline crews on polar routes at risk. Smaller geomagnetic storms have the ability to interfere with things we rely on everyday such as GPS, which is annoying for an application like Google Maps, but could be disastrous in a military context.

How did Sheboygan Christian School prepare you for your calling and career? What impact did Christian education have on you? I can trace some of the skills I need to succeed back to my education at SCS. The teachers I had were so passionate about their subject areas. Probably the best example of this was in middle school, Mr. VanDrunen made science fun! He would strut around the classroom talking about noble gases; he got everyone involved in experiments

so that science was real and happening right before our eyes. I had a chronic illness in high school and missed a lot of classroom time, but each teacher knew me personally and we worked to figure out ways to help me learn the material even if I couldn't always be present. That sort of individual attention was invaluable to my success.

I think Sheboygan Christian helped develop my calling by allowing me to pursue interests that were unique to me. I didn't want to take art classes in high school; instead I took a woodworking class and a computer-aided design (CAD) class. When I talked to Mrs. Red (math teacher) about wanting to do physics in college, she helped set up an individual study for me so I could take pre-calc in a semester, and then calculus the next semester.

There are so many cool things going on in STEM today...
the challenge is to empower [students] with the confidence
to succeed. This is particularly true for young women and
minorities who are underrepresented in STEM due to issues
of discrimination. Just like most things in life, being a good
scientist (or engineer etc) happens because of hard work and
determination. We can support students by creating a reallife connection between the basics they are learning and how
it translates into practical applications.

In high school, one of the things we talked about in Bible class was the idea of general revelation. General revelation is the idea that creation itself is witness to God's power and love. Romans 1:20 says, "For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities—his eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that people are without excuse." I think as a Christian

and a scientist this has a lot of meaning in my life. Not only do I praise God that the sun and stars are beautiful but I praise God when I understand how they work because to me that is even more magnificent. Science serves as a witness to God's handiwork.

Youth Apprenticeship

I am currently employed as a technical support worker at Acuity Insurance through the Youth Apprenticeship program. My job involves setting up computers and computer-related devices for other employees, as well as other areas of tech support. ACADEMIC & CAREER PLANNING (ACP)

One exciting update at SCS this year is that ACP (Academic

and Career Planning) has been fully implemented in grades 6-12! ACP's overall vision is for every student to graduate from high school college and career ready.

For grades 6-8, students took assessments to understand their learning styles and link their interests/ skills to career options. Students will learn about helpful school skills such as time management and problem solving. We also talk about postsecondary options, careers and high school!

For grades 9-12, each grade level has a checklist that students are required to complete. The following are a few

highlights: Freshmen learned their top 5 strengths from the StrengthsQuest Test. Sophomores will be traveling to Lakeshore Technical College to attend the Explore Your Future Event and learn more about their personality styles and careers. Juniors attended the Wisconsin Education Fair at Lakeland University. They also took the PSAT and ACT. Juniors will also participate in a Job Shadow Day. Seniors will choose between a college track and a workforce/military track. The college track will focus on college applications and scholarships, and the workforce/military track focuses on job skills like resume making, interviewing and soft skills.

As you can see, we are working hard at SCS to prepare our students for life after high school! Our goal is to help our students better understand their God given gifts and talents and how they can use them after high school.



DISCIPLESHIP

BOLD IN LEADING

All year, our school has been watching, listening, and searching for ways to BE BOLD, our theme for the year. I recently shared with my 4th grade students that I really felt some of them were ready to

lead our class in a time of devotions. We spent time talking about what student-led devotions might look, sound, and feel like. Sharing ideas is great. That's being bold. But then came the opportunity to volunteer to lead. That's being bold; a different kind of bold. To my surprise, nearly the entire class was ready to sign up!

A few weeks ago, our first student-led devotions was happening. A young lady shared scripture, a song, and an entry from <u>Jesus Calling</u> all focusing on the theme of "fear". In the end, she left us with an illustration of a young child surrounded by a cloud of fear, which she then erased with the explanation that fear doesn't win when we have Jesus.



The next week, a student had volunteers reading various Bible verses addressing protection and then we sang about how God protects, even when we don't see it.

It is wonderful to be able to witness the maturation of faith on a daily basis, but it's special in moments like these when boldness that only comes from the Holy Spirit drives our students to witness to others. I cannot wait to see what God has planned with this devotional experiment. The Lord is doing great things at SCS!

BOLD IN ACCOUNTABILITY

This semester, a group of high school students are using their lunch breaks to meet for Bible Study. With the leadership of David Cornette, Pastor of Calvary Orthodox Presbyterian Church and teacher of Old Testament Studies, they are using the resource, *This Changes Everything:* How the Gospel Transforms the Teen Years by Jaquelle Crowe.

Urging us to deepen the roots and strengthen the grip of the gospel in our whole life, Crowe directs readers to lifelong worship of God as a Christian's purpose at any age."

Recovery is a ministry based in Smyrna, GA just outside of Atlanta. The ministry was started by Daniel Wells, also known as Pastor 7.

Wells was a runaway at age 10, and due to a life of drugs, firearms and money laundering, he became one of the FBI's most wanted. He was finally captured and placed in Federal Prison, where he met Jesus Christ and was saved. When Wells was released in 2000, he made the decision to go out on the streets and help those who were going down the same road to destruction he had been on when he was younger.



Nearly 20 years later, 7 Bridges is home to 120 women and children and about 20 men. It continues to be a ministry that is focused on ending homelessness in the Atlanta area and beyond. It has been such a blessing for Kim and me to build relationships with some of the men at 7 Bridges and to bring students down year after year during Discovery Term to get them out on the streets praying over people, feeding people, and spending time living with the women and children at the ministry. It is a life changing experience we hope to offer our students for years to come!
