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BOARD UPDATE

Dear SCS family,

I chose my greeting to you carefully and intentionally—SCS family. When we moved to Wisconsin five years ago, we had one major prayer for our kids—that when we left

our bio families on the East Coast we would find a community that would substitute for that trust, intimacy, and nurturing that comes from being part of an inner circle. I love being able to share our experience of those first few weeks of becoming a part of our school.

Our first experience with SCS was through the Internet—a google search. We knew we were seeking faith-based education for our kiddos, and a basic search brought up SCS. We arranged a shadow and a visit while house hunting, and were immediately greeted by the irreplaceable Kathy Andringa, who was acting as school administrator at the time. It's funny—one can step into what we can now call “the soon-to-be old building” and notice what is missing in structure and resources, but as soon as you meet someone like Kathy, the building fades away and the love of Jesus is fully present. We didn't notice a small gym or old tile—we noticed posters hand-drawn by students depicting their favorite verses. We heard worship music echoing from behind classroom doors. We smelled the homemade lunches being prepared by Mrs. Cleveland and saw her hard at work with a smile and joy for her part in the students' day. We were barely through the doors and felt the unmistakable comfort of home.

We continued to tour the area looking for our new house, church, and school, while keeping SCS high on our list. Then, after returning to Philadelphia to finish the school year, we began to narrow our options. We settled on a nearby Sheboygan County town for our new home, and we wondered if we should do the “easy” thing and send our kids to the well-known and reputable public school.

Then, three things happened. One, we received a hand-written note from Mrs. Andringa in the mail in Philly. This was not a pitch for enrollment or a packet of school information—just a simple prayer for our kids as we began to navigate a huge transition. That one small piece of paper that flew from the Midwest landed right where we needed a bridge to our new lives, and it was more appreciated and comforting than she'll ever know. (Maybe she will now!) Second, we received an email from Sharon Eggebeen asking for help to spread wood chips. Now, we had barely even signed the mortgage papers when this request was made, but how better to get to know the community than by serving alongside others? THIS is what I wanted my children to learn: that life is bigger than them, hat the needs of the whole trump their own, and that

we need to love our neighbors as ourselves. It was like a message straight to my heart. And third, we heard a sermon about doing what is right in the eyes of the Lord, even when it seems strange to the world. At the exact same time, Brian and I both wrote “SCS” on our bulletins and agreed on our new school home without exchanging a word.

Five years later, our decision has never been more validated. As we navigate the scary waters of middle school and adolescence, it has become even more apparent that we need a wrap-around community. Mentors for them and prayers for us- haha! I jest, but it is so reassuring to know that we have partners in administration, staff, and parents who are all working toward the same goal for our kids—that they would know Jesus more fully and become world-changers for His kingdom. That when our kids enter the world outside their classroom doors, that they would be able to speak Truth, follow Him, and hold firm to their faith—all with an unmatched quality education preparing them for service and citizenship.

That is the most priceless gift we can give our children.

NEW FACE AT SCS

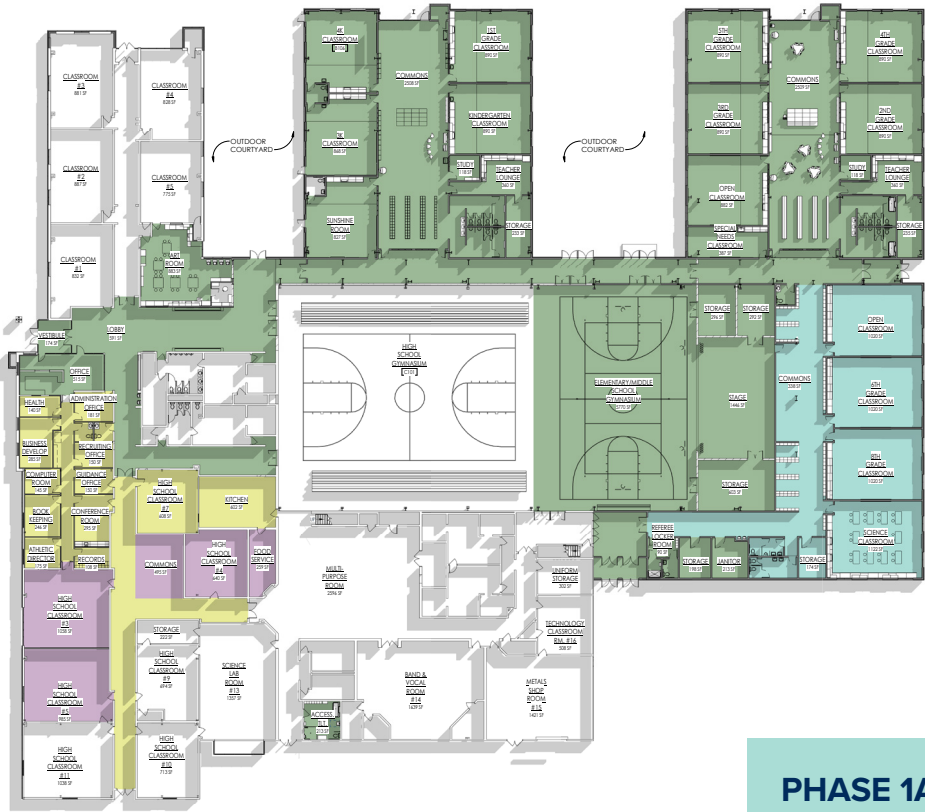
Rudi Gesch – Marketing & Enrollment Consultant

Our historic growth has created a wonderful problem: how to build a unified / new campus that houses our entire student body. Our next steps and solutions as a community and school cannot be short-sighted. We must plan and provide space for the amazing work that God is doing in this school. There is no stopping point or finish line for the mission of SCS; we must always be following where God leads us in building the hearts and minds of our students. Our building plans must follow suit.

With input and plans from the Steering Committee, we are excited to announce that the Board of Trustees has approved a phased approach to our building plans.

It is an incredible time to be a part of the SCS community and take part in God’s story here. While we are looking at record enrollment growth for the 20-21 school year,

PHASE 0.5

- Middle school move renovations.

PHASE 1

- Additions of elementary school (POD Designs).
- A new middle / grade school gym.
- New stage area located at the end of the new gym.
- Secure and updated front entrance.
- Structure and framework of middle school additions.

PHASE 1A

- Completion of new middle school rooms adjacent to the new gym addition created in Phase One.
- This will allow for the high school to expand and grow as our larger classes move into the higher grades.

PHASE 2

- Renovations of current high school classrooms and upgrades to staff offices.
- Update to the external siding of the current high school campus.

our Board and Steering Committee’s driving focus behind this building plan is not just to think about what we need from a school in 2 years, but in 4 years and 8 years down the road, etc. We believe thinking long term will only increase our growth and allow us to be as prepared as possible for the growth that God provides!

ALUMNUS SPOTLIGHT

Peter Senkbeil, Ph.D. ‘80 SCS Alumnus – Provost and Executive Vice President at Concordia University

Tell us about your current field of study, where you are, and what you are doing. I am currently the Provost and Executive Vice President at Concordia University - Irvine in California. I am married to my beautiful wife Kathryn (who was originally born in San Diego) and have two sons, Lucas and Evan, who are both university students studying chemistry at Concordia - Irvine. I studied Theatre in college, and that has been a huge part of my artistic and spiritual growth. My faith is important to me, and I consider my job my calling in ministry. When I am not working, I enjoy reading, distance running (13 half-marathons so far), and traveling with my family. I still do a little acting from time to time, too.

Why is what you are doing important? Starting with my work in theatre, I have had the opportunity to build up the theatre department at Concordia over the years,



even watching a student go on to perform in Broadway national tours! I have been able to see students come in not quite knowing who they were or what they wanted to do, and come out with a stronger sense of mission and purpose. Some were church workers, some were homemakers, others worked in businesses, and all came to a place they were loved and supported artistically and spiritually. Working in the arts can be painful, competitive and cutthroat, but I have always taught students to consider ourselves an ensemble – every part is essential.

In addition, my role as an academic administrator has allowed me to help provide the resources, support and structure for students, faculty and staff to do the important educational work they do. It is rewarding work praying with and for students, mentoring students spiritually, and watching the development of the whole student in a faith based environment. The school does not require students to sign a faith statement to enroll, therefore I see this as a huge opportunity to support Christians and non-Christians at our campus, making disciples.

How did you get there? What pathway did you take, and how did different experiences shape your pathway? I am Lutheran. I grew up attending Trinity Lutheran Church in downtown Sheboygan. After graduating from SCS, I attended Concordia College in River Forest, IL as a pre-seminary student. I was advised to diversify, so I decided to pursue a Theatre degree first. By my senior year of college, I decided I would see if there was something for myself in performing arts. I thought long about the integration of my Christian faith and theatre, and chose to pursue this instead of seminary. I was accepted at Northwestern University at Evanston, where I earned my Master’s and Ph.D. in Theatre. A special experience for me was my doctoral dissertation, in which I studied 8 professional theatres run by Christians, travelling all over North America to do the research. It was a sociological study focused on Christians in the arts, describing how their religious beliefs impact their life and work in the arts.

Through my research work, I got involved with the Christians in Theatre Arts conference, where I met the folks who hired me to be

the Artistic Director of a Michigan community theatre, Trinity House Theatre. About two years into that, I got a phone call from Christ College Irvine (now Concordia University Irvine). At the time, it was a small school of 600 students (it now has 4,000 students!), and they hired me to teach in their theatre program. I directed more than 30 plays at the university, starting as a one-person theatre department, and ran that for fourteen years. Eight years after I started, I became a Division chair in the Humanities and Fine Arts division. Later, Concordia promoted me to Associate Provost, and I have served as Provost there since 2016, supervising all of the academic aspects of the school.

How did Sheboygan Christian School prepare you for your future career? How did SCS help you with your calling?

What impact did Christian education have on you? The main way that SCS (SCCHS at the time) helped prepare me was through caring, dedicated Christian teachers who focused on the integration of faith and learning. The whole teaching staff was committed to academic excellence and faithfulness to God’s Word, and this helped shape my worldview. Art DeJong had a large impact on me through his direction of our plays, teaching English, and asking faith questions regularly. Some other faculty members that come to mind are: Larry Kooi, Chuck Rop, Dave Groenenboom, Robert Burghgraef, Margaret Brasser, and Sheryl Jonkman. These folks all loved the Lord, wanted to help students see the connections between faith and learning, and look at subject areas differently. Another special opportunity for me was being able to spend five months in Germany as a foreign exchange student during my junior year. I’m glad Christian High gave me that opportunity.

What words of advice do you have for our students who are interested in this field? How can we support them as a community? My biggest piece of advice is to not be afraid to step forward and pursue what you are interested in. The arts are sometimes regarded as an impractical field, but God can and does use people in every walk of life! And if Christians want the arts and entertainment around us to express our views and values, then we need to step up and participate in the creative work, and we need to encourage and support those who do that work.

NEXT GENERATION SCIENCE STANDARDS (NGSS)

“And God said, “Let there be light,” and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness. God called the light “day,” and the darkness he called “night.” And there was evening, and there was morning—the first day.” Genesis 1:3-5

This passage, so commonplace for many of us, should make us stop abruptly in our tracks and ask, “How? How did He do that?” God’s world of science, His hand in creation, is in constant motion. In the same way He put His plan for creation into action so many years ago, He is continuing to work a plan of action in His creation. Our challenge and opportunity as a school is to engage our students in wondering, marveling at, and exploring this ever-changing creation.

As a team of science teachers, John Andringa, Steve VanDrunen, Chris Hendrikse, June VanderPuy, and Joel Navis have been studying the NGSS (New Generation Science Standards) in an effort to align our instruction and student learning so that our students are prepared to impact His world, both near and far. We recognize that the career world we live in is also continually growing and changing. SCS seeks to develop our students’ Christian mind, and we know that there are many job opportunities out there for our students that will require and demand critical thinking, problem-solving, investigating, and solution designing.

In response to this shift in science learning, we are analyzing and testing out some different instructional approaches and curriculum resources to see how we can best meet the needs of our science learners. Some of this work

has included training with Emily Adah, experienced teacher and NGSS trainer in conjunction with the Create4STEM institute in Michigan and the SySTEMic Connection in Wisconsin, this past month and will continue over the course of

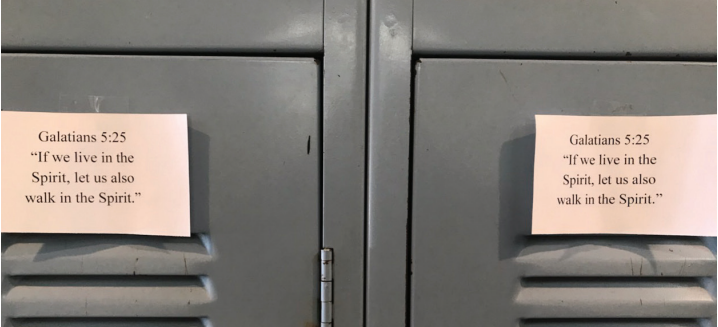
the 2020-2021 school year. We have also been blessed to receive support and training from an SCS alumnus and fellow science teacher, Kevin Kiel. As teachers, we are trying to set our students up to really marvel at the hand of God in creation, ask questions, and seek to design investigations that can help us gain better understanding. This has been challenging work, with a push and pull back and forth to find the best direction for our science program. How exciting it is to watch a staff of teachers varied in scientific experience working hard to best serve the students of SCS.

MISSION TRIPS

They rescue at risk children and provide them a home, education, food, healthcare, and most importantly love. It's an orphanage, school and church where the children are safe to grow up and they learn that there is hope in Christ! It is not unusual for some of the children to grow up in the youth home and decide as young adults to invest back into the ministry in some way.

I am super excited to get the chance to go there with a group from my church on a mission trip during spring break in March! I have even already asked my Spanish teacher to help me translate some verses and simple phrases and he was more than happy to help out! This trip personally resonates with me, because I lived in an orphanage myself just like these kids for 10 months of my life.
